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Installation of Solar Panels Nearing Completion

Solar Panels were first introduced as a possibility back in 2013 by a group of students from Mrs. Shimogawa's class doing their Civic Action project. One of the students sent a letter to the superintendent, Elizabeth Novack. When she responded, calling for a meeting, the students were fired up with excitement. They researched the price of the solar panels and how much they were paying for utilities here in the school, made a slide show, dressed up professionally, and gave a well-spoken pitch in front of everyone from the district. The district agreed to have solar panels and said that it was great to see that a group of kids seeded this idea and convinced everyone that this will be the future. This project was significantly delayed after a

robbery occurred. On September 5th, 2023, around 5 a.m., when the workers showed up, they arrived at the storage enclosure and found that the gate had been pushed over and the trailer was missing. The trailer contained the construction site tools, "the total value for all the tools was about 50 thousand dollars," according to campus Officer Martinez. The theft was not captured on surveillance cameras and so far, the police have not found any eyewitnesses of the crime. However, a fingerprint was collected from a screwdriver found at the scene and is currently being processed at the crime lab, hopefully leading to the thief. The project began at the end of school, but theft and unstable soil

have pushed this project's due date. The initial delay started when the engineers did their first check to see how the concrete was curing and tested the tension to see if it could withstand the solar panels, this test concluded that it was unsafe to start building and they decided to leave it for a 30-day review to see if the concrete cured, after 30 days they came back and said the concrete has cured properly and they could continue with the project. "The city of Cypress and especially Cypress High School has a high water table underground, this essentially means you don't have to dig very far to start hitting water underground," said Assistant Principal Tenorio. You have to consider this whenever you construct any structures, because it will impact the stability of buildings. Since the district will be saving money from the solar panels, this project didn't cost the school or district any money, it was given to them from a government grant. While many issues have led to the delay of the solar panels, they will surely make the school experience much better, after a hot day at school, your car won't be smoking hot and it will eliminate the cost of electricity, so the school could use that money to help the school if a power outage happens, there will be electricity stored ready to use! Principal Jennifer Brown urges the students to be a little more patient as the project is projected to be finished in early November 2023.

New Locker Agreement Implemented at Cypress High School

The question, "Why has the school decided to charge \$10 for a locker?" has been a controversial topic among students attending Cypress High School.

The people who were involved in making this decision consisted of the Principal, Assistant Principal, School leadership team, counselors, and teacher leaders.

Originally, Cypress High School did not have to provide lockers to students because it was not part of the Educational Code, just like driving. However, Cypress is one of the schools that offer students lockers.

Eleventh-grade assistant principal, Mr. Eric Tenorio released a statement regarding the logic behind appraising the value of a locker. He said, "We put together a locker agreement because, over the years, and had students reserving lockers they didn't use."

For example, there have been cases where leftover food along with cockroaches, knives, and alcohol were discovered in lockers at the end of the year. It progressed into a safety issue, "Our custodial staff remodels, paints, and cleans out the lockers, so a one-person job became a two-week project," Tenorio said. The collection of fees for lockers allows the school to preserve the locks and maintain an organized image. During the summer, the custodial staff washes the lockers and makes sure that they can open and close. The differences administration noticed this year are that the lockers are being used appropriately and are less crowded. Some students and parents have shared their appreciation towards the new locker agreement, which ensures their safety on campus. Furthermore, if students forget their locker combination, they

can check the main office. Furthermore, if other students report suspicious activity around the lockers, the school could check right away.

Of course, if a student is not able to purchase the locker, but needs one, they are able to talk to the front office and waive the fee.

School Year Marks Start Of New Late Start Schedule

The students and staff at Cypress High School who have a zero period have had a huge change in their weekly schedule this year. This year for the first time since Cypress opened 50 years ago they have gotten rid of their zero period classes on Thursday. They have now extended zero period on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Fridays to be an hour and five minutes long instead of 55 minutes, to make up for the time missed on Thursdays.

Since the new late start schedule started, staff and students have various opinions about the new schedule. Many students who have a zero period were very excited to hear they wouldn't have a zero period on Thursday. The students now have more time to sleep, spend time with friends and get their work done before their school day starts. The staff also benefit from the change as well because now they have time to go to professional development class, unlike last year when zero period teachers would sometimes miss their meetings before school.

There are three reasons for the schedule change. According

to Mrs. Brown the principal at Cypress High School, the schedule was a district-wide change because of the following reasons. Late start teachers are supposed to attend professional development meetings on Thursdays, the teachers who have zero period would often miss the meetings and they would miss important information. A second issue was that there was a big time gap between zero period and first period. According to Brown, kids who were having to come in early for zero period had a time span between zero period and first period. Staff were seeing an increase in issues with these students. Students were doing drugs, stealing from local stores, drinking alcohol, and some even got hit by cars. During this time students were unsupervised and it became an unsafe environment for kids. Lastly, this schedule change took place because of the bus schedule as the timings would clash with each other.

Grace Badolian, a senior at Cypress High School, states that this year's schedule helps her mental health. She is now able to get more sleep on Thursday and

has something to look forward to. Last year when Badolian had zero period she would go to her class and after sitting in the halls waiting for her friends who didn't have zero period so they could get breakfast. Now she is able to sleep in and leave ten minutes before her first period starts.

Although these changes have been good for most, there have been a few minor problems with the new schedule. One of the big

ones is that now students are unable to meet with their teacher. This has been a slight problem because zero period teachers now have to rearrange their schedule just for zero period and it puts a large workload on students, especially AP classes and performance classes like band and dance.

Overall, this year's new schedule is an improvement to the previous year's schedule.


future careers, and on the positive side, they only take 10-15 minutes each.

Check N Connect is different from how it used to be during the 2022-2023 school year since now every student completes assignments as





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
